The Academic Senate approves the following resolution:

WHEREAS the Chancellor of the CSUC is the administrative head of the largest system of public higher education in the United States, and

WHEREAS the 20,000 members of the faculty of the CSUC have deep professional and personal commitments to their universities and colleges, and are directly affected by the nature and the action of the system's head, and

WHEREAS the Trustees' initial plan for selection of a new Chancellor omits any direct faculty participation, an omission which seems incredible, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Academic Senate of CSU, Sacramento urge the Board of Trustees to include direct faculty membership on the search committee for a new Chancellor.

Report to the Academic Senate California State University, Sacramento

Meeting of State Academic Senate September 10-11, 1981

This report is for the September 10-11, 1981 meeting of the State Academic Senate at headquarters in Long Beach.

Announcements included the Board of Trustees "Committee on the Future -- 2000" to consider the future nature of the system. Substantial discussion including the agenda item below centered around budget cuts and tuition next year. One present budget cut is for travel. The state senate must travel to fulfill its mission of providing faculty input to the Trustees and to fulfill its collegial role on matters of curriculum, educational policies and faculty affairs. \$30,000 is about the real reduction and the amount is too large to get except by elimination of meetings and large reduction of the people involved in the consultatory process.

Tuition is the subject of intense systemwide discussion. We may get a 5% budget cut next year (\$50 millon). Ways to handle it are increased workload, reduced access of 25000FTE which generates a reduction of 1900 faculty and 540 staff positions or imposition of \$170 tuition. Points made in debate included comments that you don't break even with tuition since it is unrelated to decisions on what the buget ought to be and how it ought to be constructed (sources). Education in California is too cheap-therefore, not highly valued - things of low value (price) are easily abused. Apparently, the legislature neither knows what we (CSU) are about nor does it value what we do. What is happening at the moment is yet another budget exercise and we ought not participate in preemptive capitulation. The three California segments do not go alone in the imposition of tuition - waves are made for all with action in one. Increased tuition reduces access and increases workload. California is at the bottom of the list in money spent on education as a percent of disposable income, etc. The state senate did prepare a draft resolution, copies available in SSC 206.

Admission standards are being studied intensely this year and campus views are sought on English and Mathematics admission requirements. Trustee action is scheduled for January.

Senate ction items included as the first item of business Recognition of Jack Livingston, AS 1263-81 attached. A draft resolution calling for study of a systemwide foreign language requirement. A call for clarification on the rate of evaluation of tenured faculty under FSA 80-44. A State Senate resolution calling on the Trustees to have thorough faculty consultation and representation on the criteria, search and selection of the next Chancellor, AS 1257-81. A draft resolution in support of a position paper on Education and Professional Activity in the CSUC. Another resolution called for campus faculty participation in academic policy making on Extended Education. Some campuses have little to no faculty participation in the academic aspects to this - apparently as an oversite in EE 81-10 of the Chancellor's Office. There was a similar resolution on seeking impacted status and admission standards. Our campus is undertaking this action and there should be faculty participation under the normal curricular processes as we set admission standards under impaction. Endorsed with qualification creation of CSUC Distinguished Service Professorship (so that the next Chancellor can gracefully clean house). Again reaffirmed our long standing position that faculty be represented on the Trustees as we now are the only constituency who is not. Called for inclusion of administrators in the Disciplinary Action procedures as they now have none.

There were also two draft resolutions in response to the TSA action of President Horn of Long Beach.

The Chancellor was practically phlegmatic in his comments to the senate. He believes in the assurance of faculty input in the selection of his successor. He and the presidents have uniformly supported the idea of a foreign language requirement as long as "I do it." Thinks we should have tougher and more specific admission requirements because the high schools are "not now producing students properly prepared for university level work." It must be that he sees a light at the end of his tunnel.
