The Academic Senate recommends approval of the following program change proposals:

School of Arts and Sciences

- a. Chemistry B.S.: Change Chemistry 110 to Chemistry 110 and 110L, which requires the addition of one unit (to 33 units) to the total units required in upper division courses (see Attachment A).
- b. Geology B.A. and B.S.: Change in the Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science as shown in Attachment B.
- c. Home Economics B.S.: Move HUES 195C from list of "Recommended electives" to the "units from the following" location (see Attachment C).
- d. Music B.M.: Add Music 153 to the Voice concentration; add Music 154 to the Instrumental concentration; add Music 153 or Music 154 to the Credential concentration; add Music 173 and 174 to the Keyboard concentration; add Music 183A or Music 183B to the Theory/Composition concentration (see Attachment D).

School of Business Administration

- e. Undergraduate Concentrations in Business Administration: Delete MGMT 181 and add MGMT 128 in Marketing concentration; shift additional units to the elective category and delete units from the information systems category in the Operations Management concentration; delete MIS 125 from the Information/Control elective section in the Strategic Management concentration (see Attachment E).

- f. Business Administration Minor: Delete MIS 5 and 6 and the addition of Stat 1 to the Business Administration Minor (see Attachment F).
- g. Real Estate and Land Use Affairs: Add OBE 196B to the list of courses from which four courses can be chosen to be counted toward the core of the Real Estate and Land Use Affairs concentration (see Attachment G).
- h. Business Administration: Add under "Major Requirements" for the Business B.S. degree that "Communication Studies 4 (Introduction to Public Speaking) is recommended for all undergraduate business majors to satisfy the Area A1, Oral Communication, requirement for General Education." (see Attachment H).

School of Education

- i. Child Development Major: Increase units in the major from 46 to 48; move ChDv 133.0 from Required Upper Division Courses to Core A; change name of Core A to Required Foundation Courses; change number of units required in Core A from 9 to 12; offer students a choice of HE 152.0, HE 150.0, or HE 155.0 in Core B; add ChDv 135.0 to Core B; reduce units in Electives from 12 to 11; and delete ChDv 137.3 from the Catalog (see Attachment I).

School of Engineering and Computer Science

- j. Civil Engineering B.S.: Delete CSc16, add CE 101, and reposition a G.E. course from upper to lower division, and two courses (Engr 124 and a CE elective) into different semesters at the upper division level (see Attachment J).
- k. Computer Science B.S.: Add, to the last item under Required Upper Division Courses, CSc 192 to the list of courses from which students may choose two units (see Attachment K).
- l. Electrical Engineering B.S.: Change in elective structure in Electrical and Electronic Engineering program (see Attachment L).
- m. Mechanical Engineering Program: 1) Replace an elective with a required course, ME 138, 2) permit students to substitute ME 160 or ENGR 173 for ME 111 as a required course, and 3) divide existing course, ME 190, into two, ME 190 and ME 146, where the total hours of lecture and lab will remain the same (see Attachment M).

AS 91-107/GPPC, Ex. ^{Flr.} CORE REQUIREMENT FOR GRADUATE PROGRAMS
(AS 91-35 revisited)

Agreed
Based on the recommendation of the Graduate Policies and Programs Committee, the Academic Senate recommends revision of the "Policy Relating to Undergraduate and Graduate Degree Programs" (1990 Compilation of Policies and Procedures for Initiation, Modification, Review and Approval of Courses and Academic Programs, page 28) as follows [strikeover = deletion; underscore = addition; bold = conditions imposed by the President]:

... Graduate degree programs are expected to include at least three courses with no fewer than nine units, excluding independent study, field work, and the culminating experience, that are common to the degree program. All graduate majors or programs within a major must have a core curriculum requirement which emphasizes integration of knowledge and preparation for specialization and which is designed to assure mastery of requisite knowledge and skills.

The core, which is a common body of knowledge specific to a discipline, will consist of a minimum of nine units. Excluded are independent study, field work, internships and thesis units.

At least six of the nine required units must be common to all programs within the major. The remaining three units must be describable as meeting a particular educational objective within the major.

Exceptions to this nine-unit core requirement will be considered on a program by program basis. Exceptions will only be made under extraordinary circumstances and must be approved by the Vice President for Academic Affairs. Requests for exceptions along with documentation are to be submitted to the Graduate Dean and the Graduate Policies and Programs Committee for consideration.

[Note: This requirement must be met in full by May 31, 1992, or the next program review, whichever occurs first.]

AS 91-108/CC, Ex. SPECIAL MAJOR REQUIREMENTS

AGENDA MAJORS

The Academic Senate recommends that the Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science Special Major, as described in the 1990-92 Catalog description of "Special Major/Minor" (see page 523, Attachment T), be amended as follows:

SPECIAL MAJOR

To qualify, for a Special Major or Minor a student must satisfy the following requirements:

- Students must have completed all coursework prior to the application for the Special Major with a combined grade point average of 2.5.
- All approvals should be obtained...
...

Unit Requirements

A minimum total of 124 units are required for the Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science Special Major. No more than 6 units may be in Independent Study (199 or similar courses) and Fieldwork (195 or similar courses). The unit requirements for the major are:

AS 91-109/UWC, GE, Ex. G.E.--SECOND SEMESTER COMPOSITION REQUIREMENT (Amends AS 91-42)

The Academic Senate recommends revision, effective Fall 1992, of the "Policies Pertaining to the General Education Program and Course/Proficiency Requirements for Graduation with the Baccalaureate Degree," dated August 1991, Section II.B.2.a, page 24, as follows [Attachment U shows subsection B in its entirety]:

2. Second Semester Composition Requirement

a. Course Requirement

All students, including students who have completed the except those fully certified under IGETC, shall be required to complete a second semester composition course with a C- grade or better. ...

AS 91-110/UWC, GE, Ex.

G.E.--WRITING COMPONENT IN UPPER DIVISION G.E. COURSES (Amends AS 91-42)
[Responds to Senate's request AS 91-75]

The Academic Senate recommends revision, effective Fall 1992, of the "Policies Pertaining to the General Education Program and Course/Proficiency Requirements for Graduation with the Baccalaureate Degree," dated August 1991, Section I.D.b.2).a), page 10, as follows [Attachment V-1 shows subsection D in its entirety; Attachment V-2 provides University Writing Committee rationale]:

AS 91-111/AP REGISTRATION PRIORITY

The Academic Senate recommends adoption of the policy for priority registration recommended by the Academic Policies Committee, amended as follows (strikeover = deletion; underscore = addition):

Priority Registration

Until the SIS records system is in operation, priority registration shall be implemented as follows:

1. First Priority

a. Students who have 1) a disability and 2) needs related to their disability, such as a need for prearranged support services, or a need to restrict distance that must be travelled between classes, or a need to restrict the number of trips to campus. Eligibility shall be confirmed each semester by a Learning Disabilities Specialist or a Disability Management Counselor.

b. Students who are "priority workers".

2. Second Priority

Certified Students (see d. below) in selected programs that offer tutoring, group work, or other academic support services; and which the program must require that participating students register in specific courses, a sequence of courses, or specific time blocks. Approval of programs for inclusion under this priority is the responsibility of the Academic Policies Committee. Requests for program inclusion in this priority shall be reviewed by the Academic Policies Committee which shall forward its recommendations on approval to the Senate for recommendation to the President.

Second priority is extended to students in approved programs when the program head certifies that they have satisfied the following conditions:

- a. The student is an active participant in the program during the semester in question.
- b. The student is (if necessary--as determined by the program head) an active participant in the academic support services.
- c. The student, if a continuing CSUS student, has a CSUS gpa of at least 2.0 in his/her previous Spring grade report most recently recorded semester.
- d. The student is making satisfactory progress toward his/her degree--including the following (with the possible exception of the student's first semester at CSUS):
 - the student has satisfied the English composition requirement, or is enrolled in the English composition course, or in the appropriate remedial courses.
 - the student has satisfied the Quantitative reasoning requirement, or is enrolled in a Quantitative reasoning courses, or in the appropriate remedial courses.

In each of the above cases, if a student is enrolled in a course but does not successfully complete the course (i.e., receives a grade of NC or lower than C-) then that student will not be permitted to receive second priority until the student has successfully completed the course.

- the student is enrolled in appropriate courses for his/her major (the program head can determine this by having the student's major advisor sign the student's CAR form).

~~If a program head certifies that students have satisfied the above requirements, and his/her certifications are later found to be incorrect, then eligibility of the program's students for priority will be terminated. The program head may appeal this decision to the Academic Policies Committee. The committee will then determine whether future certifications of eligibility of students from this program will be accepted. Program eligibility shall be reviewed for consistency with the guidelines by the appropriate administrator in consultation with the Academic Policies Committee.~~

3. Additional Priorities

Students not receiving first or second priority as defined above shall receive priority in the following order:

Graduating seniors, freshmen, seniors, classified graduate students, juniors, sophomores, unclassified graduate students.

FIRST READING

AS 91-113/Ex. SCHOLARSHIP, DESCRIPTION OF (CALL FOR REFERENDUM)

The Academic Senate calls for a referendum of the faculty to establish the following as the description of scholarship at CSU Sacramento:

Scholarship is the quality of learning characterized by a broad, deep, and current understanding of the content, perspectives, theories, methods, potential, limitations, and pedagogy in a particular academic and epistemological enterprise.

Scholarship is associated with thinking openly, deeply, and critically; it encompasses the processes of discovery, integration, application, creation, and criticism. Faculty can engage in each of these processes at varying levels of scholarship.

Scholarship also encompasses dissemination, which might take many forms, including publications, conference presentations, lectures, reorganization of course content, participation in exhibits or performances, consulting, teaching, and service to the University or to professional organizations. No form is inherently more scholarly than another.

Evaluation of the Proposed Changes to the Bachelor of Science in Chemistry

The change involves splitting CHEM 110 which is currently 3 units of lecture (C4) and 1 unit of lab (C16) into two separate courses. CHEM 110 will be a 3 unit lecture course (C4), and CHEM 110L will be a 2 units lab course (C16). Currently CHEM 110 is offered every Fall with an enrollment of 14. The new courses will also be offered every Fall with a similar enrollment. The net effect is an increase of 2 wtu every Fall semester, or a yearly average of 1 wtu. This change should not have any significant fiscal impact.

Briefly describe the change requested and the justification for the change:
 The change of Chemistry 110 to Chemistry 110 and Chemistry 110L requires the addition of one unit to the total units required in upper division courses for the BS degree in Chemistry: 32 to 33 units. No other changes in the BS degree are proposed. The additional one unit is needed to accommodate the additional laboratory period in the new Chemistry 110L (lab) course.

The change of Chemistry 110 to Chemistry 110 and Chemistry 110L requires the addition of one unit to the total units required in upper division courses for the BS degree in Chemistry: 32 to 33 units. No other changes in the BS degree are proposed. The additional one unit is needed to accommodate the additional laboratory period in the new Chemistry 110L (lab) course.

2. B.S. in Chemistry
3. Purpose of Change: To separate Chemistry 110, Inorganic Chemistry, into separate lecture and laboratory courses (both exist together under rubric of Chemistry 110) and to add extra student hours to laboratory.

4. Need for Change: Students have informally requested the change to two courses because they perceive difficulty in establishing a final grade for the course based on two distinctly different activities. There is some merit to the argument. The more important reason for the change is the need for additional student contact hours to complete advanced experiments. The laboratory be accomplished in a single three hour laboratory. In some ways, the laboratory provides a structured culminating experience in chemistry. These types of activities are very time intensive. To provide the proper experimental environment, it is necessary to expand the number of laboratory hours. (In reality, the students do the hours now without student credit for them).

5. No programmatic impact on other academic units and programs will occur.

6. The Department of Chemistry wants to make the following change in its B.S. program:

Change Chemistry 110 (4 units) to a lecture only course, Chemistry 110 (3 units), and a laboratory only course, Chemistry 110L (2 units). Increase the number of required U.D. units in the B.S. degree program to 33 units (from 32).

Justification for Change in the Geology B.A. and B.S. Degrees

The motivation for changes proposed here are several.

1. The science of Geology is multifaceted and evolving.
2. By streamlining the curriculum, students can graduate sooner.
3. We are responding to the University and School Resource Allocation plan by (a) reducing the number of electives required and offered in the major; (b) combining classes to eliminate concentration/option requirements, and (c) reducing the frequency and number of low-enrolled classes.

The proposed changes result in no change in unit value in the B.A. or B.S. The proposed program will cost less since there are fewer low enrollment electives required. There should be a substantial savings to the School because of the more streamlined nature of the program. Two days of faculty workshops and many hours of discussion has resulted in a decrease in prerequisites in a number of classes and a course sequencing model that makes graduation on time far more probable than in the past. Specifically, students entering their junior year with the required prerequisites will be able to get all the classes they need reasonably schedule in four semesters.

Changes and Justification

New courses:

Geology 104 Metamorphic Petrology (2 units) - Until now, Igneous and Metamorphic Petrology have been combined in a single, 4-unit course. Both take somewhat different approaches and, for that reason, should be two separate courses. The Geology Department feels that thin sections should be used extensively in both courses and is proposing to add an introduction to the polarizing microscope to Geol 102. This will consume approximately one unit of that class' time, so we propose that Geol 102 be a 3 unit course in igneous petrology and thin section microscopy and Geol 104 a 2 unit course in metamorphic petrology that builds on the microscopic techniques learned in Geol 102.

Description: The origin, classification, chemical and physical characteristics of metamorphic rocks. Determination of physical chemical and tectonic environments during metamorphism. Emphasis in the laboratory will be on hand specimen and thin section observation and interpretation. Laboratory three hours. Not offered every semester. Prerequisite: Geol 102; 2 units.

Geology 107 Applied Geology (3 units) - This course is offered early in the major curriculum to allow all majors to see the applications of geologic knowledge, incite them to more diligent study, and make them aware of professional options available to geologists.

Description: The application of geology to such topics as groundwater, civil engineering, petroleum, and metallic and non-metallic resources. Topics may vary from year to year. Field trip. Prerequisites: Geol 9, 10, and 12, Chem 1A. Not offered every semester.

Revised Course:

Geology 112 Basic Principles of Geophysics and Geochemistry (3 units) - This course is being revised to include content from the geochemistry course. Previously these elective courses were taken primarily by students planning graduate work in geochemistry and geophysics. Although the Geology Department has never had a formal concentration in these areas, combining the classes will create one high enrollment course replacing two lower enrollment courses that were more specialized options.

Description: Introduction to the basic principles of seismology, earthquakes and heat flow. Study will include the gravitational, magnetic and electrical fields of the Earth. Also basic principles of isotope geology, and the origin, abundance, distribution and migration of the elements in the various parts of the Earth. Prerequisite: Geol 10.

The above three courses add eight required units. The units will replace units acquired by deleting classes and units described below:

Geology 120 Geomorphology (reduced from 2 to 1 unit) - The lecture component will be dropped from this class and incorporated into other geology classes. The important lab technique portion will be retained.

Geology 102 Igneous Petrology (reduced from 4 to 3 units) - This course is losing one unit because material from this course will now be taught in the newly created Geol 104.

Geology 105 Paleontology (reduced from 4 to 3 units) - One hour of lecture has been cut from this class. Most students will find two hours of lecture provides adequate background for the commonly pursued geology fields.

Geology 188 Geowriting (1) - This class is deleted and writing will be incorporated into most all geology major classes.

Geology 189 Colloquium (1) - This class is deleted. Students will be strongly encouraged to attend guest speaker lectures brought to campus.

Electives (3) - This is a reduction from 6 units. The result will be fewer low enrolled elective courses.

Finally, Geology 9 Physical Geology Lab (1) will replace Geology 13 Historical Geology Lab (1) as a lower-division prerequisite. This is being done to better conform with community college curricula which provides Geology 9, but not 13.

The B.S. degree in Geology will require the same changes as the B.A.

Proposed Changes to Marketing Concentration

The Management Department requests that three of its undergraduate concentrations be modified - Marketing, Operations Management, and Strategic Management.

Marketing

Marketing proposes changes to the elective offerings in the Marketing Concentration: deleting MGMT 181, Purchasing and Materials Management, and adding new course MGMT 128.

Justification: The adjustments will make the elective offerings more relevant to the marketing discipline.

Fiscal Impact: There will be some shifting of enrollments from the deleted class to other marketing courses and some shifting of enrollments from the other marketing courses to the new class, but there will be no external effect.

Operations Management

OSM proposes shifting additional units to the elective category and deleting units from the information systems category.

Justification: The new Business major features an information systems class in the required core curriculum, thus most students will not need to take additional information systems classes.

Fiscal Impact: We estimate that about twenty students per year would no longer take MIS 121.

Strategic Management

OSM proposes deleting one course from the Information/Control elective section.

Justification: The MIS Department has told us that the course, MIS 125, is to be phased out.

Fiscal Impact: We estimate that a small number of students may choose other course alternatives while MIS 125 is being phased out, thus there will only a minor fiscal effect.

JUSTIFICATION: The revised Business Administration major has a core class in Management Information Systems (MIS 175). Consequently, students following the OM concentration will no longer be required to take a MIS course, but may elect to take additional MIS courses should they choose. Due to the modification of the MIS parts of the Business Administration major, MIS 125 will be phased out. Thus it is omitted from the list of elective courses. There will be no significant fiscal impact.

Strategic Management Concentration (21)

The Strategic Management concentration permits a focus upon the skills of the manager, whether the manager is an entrepreneur or operating at the corporate or agency level, with emphasis on the skills of decisionmaking as taught through the case method. Managerial skills in planning, organizing, and controlling are highly transferable within private industry and within the public and nonprofit sector as well, thus permitting a wide variety of career goals.

There are two proposals one from OBE and one, involving three concentrations, from Management.

OBE: OBE 196B has been added to a list of four courses, students will now choose four out of five courses on that list.

Since the department will offer 196B instead of one of the other courses, there should not be any fiscal impact.

Marketing Concentration: replacement of MGMT 181 by 128 in a list of 11 MGMT courses of which the students choose four.

Since the courses are both in the same department and have the same course classification, it appears that the change will have no fiscal impact.

Operation management Concentration: a choice of one of MIS 121 or 125, and one of a list of 10 courses, all but one in the School of Business, is replaced by a choice of two of from the same list to which MIS 121 has been added. The net result appears to be the elimination of MIS 125 and added flexibility for the students.

It appears that this change should have no significant impact.

Strategic Management Concentration:

Fiscal Impact Analysis

Proposed Change in Minor Requirements

Introduction

The proposed change is to delete MIS 5 and 6 and add Stat 1 to the Business Administration Minor in the 1992/93 catalog. This is an extension of a change already made in the Business Administration major for the lower division core requirements. The estimated number of Business Administration minors is 100 per semester. The lower division course minor requirements are available at the community colleges which makes it hard to estimate what the demand will be.

Fiscal Analysis

The necessity of taking the Stat 1 course at CSUS must take into consideration whether the student was a prior Business Administration major changing to a minor, or a transfer student having taken the course. Based on that assumption, the possibility is that about a third of the minors would need Stat 1 at CSUS, or one class section of 30 students. The Business Administration Department plans to phase out MIS 6 by 1992 and MIS 5 by 1993.

Conclusion

If the impact on the Business Administration Department would be continuation of the phase out of MIS 5 and 6. The Mathematics Department may in the future need to add 1 section per semester depending on the demand or 6 WTU's per year or .2 FTEF.

All courses are 04 classification, and there are 398 majors as of Fall 1991.

Teacher Education estimates that there will be a net change of 1.5 WTU's per semester, although their table is quite confusing (See attached). Apparently, there will be some phase in/out required of Ch Dev 135.0 which is undergoing a title/content change at the same time that it is being re-categorized. Further, Ch Dev 137.3 is being deleted (however, it was not offered in Spring 1991 or Fall 1991). Finally, Ch Dev/HES 157.0 HES, the effect has been halved throughout the table).

The unit change is understated. The net increase from 46 to 48 units is not totally forthright as only one of the many electives available is a two unit course and all others are three units, thus it is probable that almost every major will have at least 49 units instead of 48 in the PCP. Effectively, every major must take an additional elective. However, due to the many courses available, it is likely that the additional demand can be absorbed within existing class limits without necessitating additional course offerings.

Our analysis is that the new program will add 9 WTU's per year since the 3 WTU's per year estimated by Teacher Education. Since Ch Dev 137.3 has not been offered, a deletion may not be warranted. The WTU effects of Ch Dev/HES 157.0 seem all right if there are to be 3 sections per term with each unit paying half the freight.

3. The purpose of the change is to introduce an upper division junior-level computer applications course in the civil engineering curriculum, so that all majors in the program (including community college transfers) are provided with uniform exposure to computer applications available in the five disciplines of civil engineering.
4. Civil engineering students need experience solving actual engineering problems with the aid of a computer. Although engineers writing programming principles is important, few civil engineers write computer programs. Therefore it is more valuable to have experience applying the computer to the particular programming language. This course will form the foundation for computer usage in subsequent civil engineering courses.
5. The change affects the Computer Science Department (CSC 16 is eliminated as a requirement), and the Mechanical Engineering Department (Engr 124 is moved from the 5th to the 7th semesters). There is no programmatic impact on either of these departments. There is no fiscal impact on the M.E. Department. The CSC Department will be affected fiscally by the decrease in pre-C.E. majors in CSC 16 service course. This is estimated to be about 5 FTEs/year. The Chairs of all three departments in the School were provided with a package of information similar to that enclosed herewith prior to discussion in the Academic Council of the School. The Academic Council, which consists of two elected faculty from each of the four departments in the School, approved the new course unanimously.

Fiscal Impact Analysis Change in B.S. in Civil Engineering

The Department of Civil Engineering proposes to remove the lower division requirement of CSc 16, a 2 unit class, for majors, while adding a requirement of CE 101, a 3 unit class. Such a change in a highly structured major requires adjustment of the sequencing of other courses in the major.

The deletion of the CSc 16 requirement will, by the CE Department's estimation, affect approximately 40 students per year. This would cause approximately one fewer section per year to be offered, which would result in a decrease of 2 wtu's per year, or 1 wtu per semester, in faculty usage in the Computer Science Department.

The addition of the new course, CE 101, will affect 30-40 students per semester. More students are affected by this because it is an upper division change. CE 101 has lecture and lab components--2 units of C4 lecture, run with 60 students per section and a cost of 2 wtu's per section, and 1 unit of C16 lab, run with 30 students per section and a cost of 2 wtu's per section. Thus in a three semester period 2 additional sections of the lecture (4 semester wtu's) and 4 additional sections of the lab (8 semester wtu's) would be needed. The total cost would be approximately 4 wtu's per semester, on average. The department states that it will absorb these costs within its existing faculty allocation.

The changes in the sequencing of the courses in the programs of the CE majors might have small effects on demand for particular courses, but this would only occur during the transitional period.

Summary

The proposed changes would save approximately 1 wtu per semester in the Computer Science Department and cost approximately 4 wtu's per semester in the Civil Engineering Department.

Changes to the Mechanical Engineering program and the justification for the same are as follows:

1. One unit of instruction in electric motors has been included in the first semester of the senior project course, ME 190. Many students are designing and building senior projects which include electric motors and thus need a background in this topic before starting the actual design. Therefore the instruction in electric motors has been separated into a stand-alone one unit course (ME 146), which will be taught in the second semester of the junior year. This portion of ME 190 has always been taught as a stand alone topic by a part-time instructor or a member of the EEE faculty. This change will not require any additional resources. A general education course and Engr 140 have been exchanged between the junior and senior years to keep the total units in each semester at 18 or less.

2. One ME Design elective has been replaced by a required course, ME 138, Concurrent Product and Process Design. This course will include two units of design and one unit of the application of probability and statistics to engineering problems. At the present time, the ME program has one lower division manufacturing course, ME 37. In the past the program included an upper division course, ME 139; this course was made an elective several years ago when ME 175, Computer Applications in ME, was added to the program. Given the renewed interest in manufacturing, the changing employment market for engineers in the the Sacramento area, and the proposed ABET requirement of the application of probability and statistics to engineering, the ME department concluded that a required upper division course in manufacturing is essential to keep the program current. This change will not increase the total units in the program and will not require any additional resources.

3. The vibrations course, ME 111, is replaced by a short list as follows:

ME 111 Mechanical Vibrations
ME 160 Automatic Controls
Engr 173 Intro to Finite Element Analysis

The ME faculty feel all three of these topics are important to students interested in design. Given the severe limit on available units in the curriculum, the department feels this arrangement is the best compromise available at this time. This change will not increase the total units in the program or require any additional resources. A student may take a second, or all three of these courses by counting the additional course (or courses) as electives. Vibrations is currently included in the course description of ME 115, a required course; the coverage of vibrations in this course will be expanded.

A side-by-side listing of the current program and the proposed program is attached. The current program listing shown includes a previously approved move of ME 116 to the junior year.

These changes were approved by the ME faculty at a department meeting on September 18. The faculty feel these changes will keep the program reasonably current for the next three years. A complete review of the curriculum is planned and will be completed prior to the deadline for the 1991-96 catalog.

The unit values of ED TE 5200, Master of Arts Thesis--Curriculum & Instruction and ED TE 5220, Master of Arts Project--Curriculum & Instruction, are being increased from three (3) to four (4) units in order to offer additional emphasis to this culminating activity and to make it self supporting.

Fiscal Impact Analysis

Curriculum and Instruction M.A. Program Change

Proposal:

This proposed change requests a unit increase from 3 to 4 for ED TE 520.0. The number of elective units is proposed to be reduced from 12 to 11, and the program is maintained at 30 units total.
Analysis:

Because students are often allowed to apply converted quarter units and one or two unit courses to electives, the reduction from 12 to 11 elective units should have little if any programmatic impact.

ED TE 520.0 and 522.0 are both supervised courses with the same S factor of 25 students max. The WTU's in these courses are driven by student enrollment, with 2 students equaling 1 WTU.

Since Fall '89, course enrollments have been:

TOTAL	24	21	21	26	25

With an arithmetic mean of 23.4 among those five semesters. Each of those total enrollments falls approximately within 2.5 students + or - from the mean; 2 semesters are below and 3 semesters are above the mean.

For Fall 1991, each of these courses was approved for variable unit credit of 3 - 4, rather than the cataloged 3 units. This unit modification lends support to the requested program change.

The S factor (25 students x 3 units divided the normative ratio of 75 being equal to 1 FTEF) gives rise to an added dimension. There seems to be no reason to believe that a unit increase from 3 to 4 for each of these courses will increase or decrease normal student demand. But the unit increase will generate additional FTEF given application of the S factor.

Conclusion

The arithmetic mean of 23.4 students x 4 units divided the normative ratio of 75 will equal 1.25 FTEF. Therefore, the requested program change should generate approximately .25 FTEF per semester or .50 FTEF per year.



Change in Education, Reading Specialist M.A.

The Department of Education proposes several curricular modifications and one significant change in course requirements. The curricular changes involve changing the titles and updating the content of several required courses, and have no fiscal impact. The significant program change is the replacement of ED TE 221.6 with ED 220.1 for the Reading Option.

The Education Department offers a wide variety of programs, credentials and certificates within their Masters Program. Among them are the Reading Specialist Option Program and the Reading Specialist Certificate Program. The Certificate requires a bit more coursework than the Option, but is otherwise quite similar. The department informs the committee that most students who are enrolled in the Option Program, although there are a few students with existing degrees who are returning only for the certificate, and that the combined programs graduate only about 8 students per year.

The current 220.1 course is a study of Advanced Language and Learning, and is not included in the list of required courses for the Option, although it is required for the Certificate. The proposed 220.1 course is to be entitled "Language and Literacy in Multicultural Settings" and is also to be required for the Reading Option. The Department has expressed willingness to expand the size of the existing section of 220.1 to accommodate the very small number of additional students this addition may create.

In addition, the department proposes eliminating ED TE 221.6 from the Option Program. The 221.6 course has not been offered for some time, and is being dropped from the new catalog. This course has been required for both the Option and the Certificate; the department informs the committee that a proposal to eliminate this course from the Certificate will be forthcoming as soon as it has been approved by the State. The most vital material from this course is to be added to the (proposed) restructured 221.5, which is currently required in both the Option and the Certificate.

This series of changes should have no impact on the number of courses students in the Option must take. The department enrolled only 9 students in 220.1 last semester, and is willing to adjust the size of sections to accommodate any additional students; they anticipate an increase of zero to five students in the one existing section of 220.1 per year. The elimination of 221.6 would normally make available one additional section per year, but it has not been offered for some time.

When it is proposed, the elimination of 221.6 from the Certificate will reduce the number of courses a Certificate candidate must take by 1, but if this course is eliminated from the catalog under the present proposal, there should be no change in course offerings needed at that time.

Therefore, if adopted, this proposal will have no fiscal impact.



When an existing, authorized Bachelor's Degree, Minor, Certificate, or Non-Certificate Program of Study does not meet the needs of a student, a Special Major or Minor can be requested. The Special Major or Minor can be a first and only one, or a second major or minor. In the latter case, students are encouraged to develop a program of study which complements the first major. In most cases, programs will be interdisciplinary in nature. Materials concerning the procedures and requirements applying to special majors and minors can be obtained in the office of the Assistant Vice President for Academic Affairs, Administration 226.

Unit Requirements

A minimum total of 124 units are required for the Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science Special Major. The unit requirements for the major are:

first BA or BS—36 upper division units
second BA—24 upper division units
double major BA—24 upper division units
second BS—36 upper division units
double major BS—36 upper division units

In all cases at least two thirds of the upper division units must be taken in residence, i.e., at CSUS.

SPECIAL MAJOR

To qualify, for a Special Major or Minor a student must satisfy the following requirements:

- All approvals should be obtained at least one year in advance of graduation date.
- Describe the educational and career objectives sought.
- Identify and justify the relationship of the pattern of study requested to the objectives sought. With respect to the second (complemental) major program, rationale should indicate the degree to which the two majors are distinguishable from one another.
- Outline the course work and academic activity necessary to complete the objectives cited.
- Obtain the assistance and approval of two or more faculty advisors. Because of the interdisciplinary nature of the Special Major, students are required to obtain the assistance and concurrence of faculty advisors from the key instructional units listed in the Program of Study.
- Obtain the approval of the appropriate School Dean.
- Submit all materials for review and approval to the Office of the Assistant Vice President for Academic Affairs, Academic Affairs, Administration Building 226.
- The program does not qualify for special major authorization until all parties, faculty and deans, have approved the program.

SPECIAL MINOR

The Special Minor requires a total of 18 semester units, which includes a minimum of 12 upper division units in field of specialization.

GRADUATE PROGRAM

The Special Major for the master's degree provides an alternative for superior students whose special needs and interests cannot adequately be met by any one of the existing master's degree programs of the University. The student may earn a Master of Arts or a Master of Science, as appropriate to the department in which the culminating experience requirement is completed.

The Special Major consists of a combination of courses from two or more departments and may bridge two or more schools within the University. The courses must be carefully selected for their correlation and applicability to the objective of the unique major being proposed. The proposed program must be compatible with the objectives of the University and supportable by courses already offered in the regular degree programs and by the expertise of members of the faculty.

B. COURSE/PROFICIENCY REQUIREMENTS IN WRITING

1. All students must complete a first semester college composition course (English 1A or equivalent) with a grade of C- or higher. This requirement may also be met with English 1A credit earned by a passing score on the English Equivalency Examination. Courses meeting this requirement also satisfy the Area A-2 requirement of the CSUS G.E. Program and the IGETC English Communication Subject Area requirement.

2. Second Semester Composition Requirement

a. Course Requirement

All students, including students who have completed the IGETC shall be required to complete a second semester composition course with a C- grade or better. This requirement may also be met with course credit earned with a specified score on the English Equivalency Examination. The requirement is a graduation requirement, not a G.E. requirement. Composition/critical thinking courses taken to satisfy CSU G.E. Breadth Requirements or IGETC requirements do not necessarily satisfy the requirement. Second semester composition courses taken at other institutions may satisfy the requirement if they are determined by the CSUS English Department to be equivalent.

b. Criteria for Courses Satisfying the Requirement

Courses meeting the requirement shall normally be lower division courses and shall focus on composition writing and on reading. Generally, the course shall continue instruction and practice in the kinds of writing tasks introduced in English 1A and shall include readings in and writings based on multicultural literature. Course grades shall be assigned primarily on the student's demonstrated writing ability. The curriculum of the course shall emphasize the following:

- a review of composition principles
- continued work on the thesis, organization, development
- continued work on revision
- closer reading of texts
- summarizing texts in writing
- reviewing texts in writing
- evaluating texts in writing
- integrating texts of others into students' own prose
- constructing an argument, marshalling evidence, persuading
- research techniques
- writing longer papers than are required in 1A
- refining style

- Writing precisely and concisely
- Improving use of language

c. Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement (Writing Proficiency Examination)

- 1) CSU System Policy (Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement, E.O. 514)

Under the provisions of E.O. 514⁴ (Competency in Student Writing Skills), effective date November 6, 1987, "All students subject to the degree requirements of the 1977-78 or subsequent general catalogs must demonstrate writing skills at the upper division level as a requirement for graduation and as a prerequisite to classified standing in graduate programs." While the requirement is a systemwide requirement (identified by the appellation "Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement" (GWAR)), campuses are provided some latitude in determining how the requirement is to be met.

E.O. 514 specifies the following: "Certification of graduation writing proficiency is an all-campus responsibility. Certification may rely on evidence of writing ability in written coursework, essay examinations or other measures of student writing competence. Measures may be developed which best fit individual campus needs. However, certification by examination shall be at the campus level and shall include a common essay examination written and evaluated under controlled conditions and graded by a least two faculty readers."

- 2) CSUS Campus Policy (Writing Proficiency Examination)

CSUS has chosen the examination option for certification of writing proficiency. The CSUS Policy on Writing Proficiency is provided below.

⁴E.O. 514 also includes provisions pertaining to placement in writing skills programs (i.e., the English Placement Test requirement)

POLICY ON WRITING PROFICIENCY

- A. Writing Proficiency Requirement
 - 1. Candidates for the baccalaureate degree⁵, will be required to demonstrate proficiency in writing.
 - 2. The requirement applies to all students subject to the degree requirements of the 1977-78 or subsequent catalogs.
- B. Writing Proficiency Examination
 - 1. Students must satisfy the requirement by passing the Writing Proficiency Examination. The examination will be offered at least once each semester.
 - 2. The Writing Proficiency Examination is to be taken in the first semester of the Junior year; or, if a student enters CSUS at a later stage in his or her career, in the first semester of attendance.
 - 3. Completion of the second semester composition course requirement with a C- grade or higher (or earning equivalent course credit through the English Equivalency Examination) shall be a prerequisite for the Writing Proficiency Examination.
 - 4. Each student taking the examination will have two and a half hours to write a single essay. Essay topics can be dealt with on the bases of common knowledge.
 - 5. Each essay will be evaluated by two readers, and by a third if the first two disagree.
 - 6. The readers will be full- and part-time faculty members chosen by the English Composition Committee.
 - 7. Any student who fails the examination may meet with one of the examination readers to seek advice + regarding appropriate instruction in composition and/or to ask for a reevaluation of the student's examination essay. (Reevaluation procedures will be designed and supervised by the Coordinator of Writing Proficiency Examinations.)

⁵The writing proficiency requirement also applies to candidates for a second bachelor's degree and graduate students.

⁶Pending a recommendation from the University Writing Committee.

⁷A University Writing Committee has been established (see section IV.B) to advise the Senate on matters pertaining to writing requirements, including the Writing Proficiency Examination.

- 3) Upper division courses may be somewhat narrower in scope than lower division courses and they may require more specialized preparation, but they must nevertheless convey knowledge or skills of broad applicability to one or more fields of study.

b. Writing Requirements

- 1) Writing Component in Lower Division G.E. Courses
 - a) All lower division courses listed in the G.E. Program, unless granted an exception as provided in paragraph c) below, shall include writing which encourages students to think through concepts of the course. This may be accomplished in a variety of ways, including use of laboratory reports, essay examinations, formal writing assignments, and/or informal assignments. Writing in lower division courses need not be graded, but must, at a minimum, be evaluated for clarity and proper handling of terms, phrases, and concepts related to the course.
 - b) Whenever possible, an early writing sample should be obtained to assess whether any students in the course should be advised concerning appropriate available tutoring or ancillary courses for students with writing difficulties.
 - c) The course syllabus submitted to the G.E. Course Review Committee for initial G.E. listing of the course and periodic course review shall indicate how the writing objectives for lower division G.E. courses are met by the course. Requests for exception to the writing requirement shall also be submitted to the G.E. Course Review Committee which shall determine whether the justification provided warrants an exception.
 - 1) They are designed for the general student with no specialized knowledge or methodological preparation.
 - 2) They are designed to convey general knowledge or skills applicable to numerous fields of study rather than more specialized subjects and complex approaches.
- ²All upper division courses approved for G.E. listing must require at least second semester standing and completion of all Area A requirements as prerequisites for enrollment. The implementation of this policy will be phased in and requires the development of appropriate computer technology. Implementation will begin with requiring second semester sophomore standing and completion of Area A.2 (e.g. English 1A).

2) Writing Component in Upper Division G.E. Courses

- a) Upper division G.E. courses, unless granted an exception as provided in paragraph c) below, shall include substantial writing assignments (a minimum of 1500 words of formal, graded writing assignments. The writing in these assignments, as well as mastery of content, shall be evaluated and shall enter into the determination of the grade for the assignment and the final grade in the course. Criteria for evaluation of the writing shall, at a minimum, include: clarity of focus, organization and sentence structure; adequacy of idea development; and pertinence of the response to the specific assignment. Preferably there should be more than one formal writing assignment and each writing assignment should be due in stages throughout the semester to allow the writer to revise after receiving feedback from the instructor. In addition, informal writing assignments ideally should be included to move the student forward toward completion of the formal writing assignments.
- b) Whenever possible, an early writing sample should be obtained to assess whether any students in the course should be advised concerning appropriate available tutoring or ancillary courses for students with writing difficulties.
- c) The course syllabus submitted to the G.E. Course Review Committee for initial G.E. listing of the course and periodic course review shall indicate how the upper division writing objectives are met. Requests for exception to the writing requirement shall also be submitted to the G.E. Course Review Committee which shall determine whether the justification provided warrants an exception.

RATIONALE:

Lower division General Education course writing component:

The committee believes that the writing requirement in these courses is minimal and allows faculty to use writing in a variety of ways best suited to their course and allows them to vary the quantity of writing to meet the needs of fluctuating enrollment. Essay questions on exams, periodic learning log or journal entries, exploratory in-class writing, or lab reports seem to the committee appropriate activities given the considerable research that consistently indicates the value of informal writing as a learning tool (see, for instance, several articles in CSUS' The Teaching Newsletter). Quickly reading periodic one page learning logs and making a brief two-three sentence comment, or having students exchange log entries and responding to one another increase active learning, can inform the instructor of the students' progress and encourage contact between student and faculty. As budget crises increase class size, often making students feel less engaged in their classes, it is increasingly important to maintain faculty-student contact and to find ways to ensure that our students are engaging with the course material; the minimal writing requirement in lower division G.E. courses does just that.

Regarding: Proposal for writing requirements in General Education courses.

BACKGROUND:

On September 26th, 1991, the Academic Senate directed the University Writing Programs Committee to "develop a proposal pertaining to writing requirements, general education and class size." The committee therefore reconsidered the General Education course writing requirements passed by the Senate and approved by the President in spring 1991 in light of increased class size due to current budget cuts. (See attached AS 90-49A.2 and AS 90-49B.2.)

RECOMMENDATION:

The University Writing Programs Committee recommends the following:¹

1. WRITING COMPONENT IN LOWER DIVISION G.E. COURSES:
The committee recommends no change in the policy approved Spring, 1991.
2. WRITING COMPONENT IN UPPER DIVISION G.E. COURSES:
The committee recommends no change in the writing requirements but does recommend that enrollment in upper division General Education courses be limited to 50.
