WHEREAS:

AS 96-94/Flr. ROTC, CSUS SENATE RESOLUTION ON

2 3	WILDIG.	discrimination on the basis of age, ethnicity, religion, sexual preference, marital status, pregnancy, or Vietnam era veteran status in any of its programs and activities; and	
4 5 6 7	WHEREAS:	The CSUS Academic Senate in AS 91-40 and 91-74 expressed its full support of the University's nondiscrimination policy and urged CSUS President Gerth to discontinue ROTC Programs on the CSUS campus if they could not comply with the University's nondiscrimination policy, and	
8 9 10 11 12	WHEREAS:	After extensive consultation between CSUS President Gerth, ROTC, and the Department of Defense, it was determined that the Department of Defense policy that excludes from military ranks homosexuals who self-identify or are known to engage in homosexual relations applies to ROTC Programs and prohibits compliance of ROTC Programs with the University's policy on nondiscrimination; and	
13 14 15 16 17	WHEREAS:	CSUS President Gerth in a memo to the CSUS campus community dated February 11, 1992, innounced that he would inform the Department of Defense that "while it is our wish to etain ROTC at California State University Sacramento, if the Department's policy regarding exual orientation is not vacated by the spring of 1993, we will act to bring about an orderly hase out of ROTC at this campus"; and	
18 19 20 21 22	WHEREAS:	Failure of the Department of Defense to eliminate its policy on the exclusion of homosexuals from military ranks including appointment as ROTC cadets or midshipmen in University ROTC Programs necessitated CSUS President Gerth's implementation of an orderly phase out of ROTC programs at CSUS because of non-compliance with the University's nondiscrimination policy; and	
23 24 25 2/ 27	WHEREAS:	At the time of President's Gerth's action to implement discontinuation of ROTC programs at CSUS for non-compliance with the University's non-discrimination policy, provision was made to ensure that all currently enrolled ROTC students would have the opportunity to complete the program, and it was further determined that there would be no substantial impact on other CSUS programs or on current or future students at CSUS: and	

1 2 3 4	WHEREAS:	On September 30, 1996, President Clinton signed into law the 1997 Omnibus Appropriations Act which included the "Solomon Amendment" that created the Campus ROTC Access Act which modifies the Armed Forces Code (Title 10) of the United States Code to include the following provision:
5 6 7 8 9 10 11		"DENIAL OF FUNDS FOR PREVENTING ROTC ACCESS TO CAMPUS: None of the funds made available to this or any other Department of Labor, Health and Human Services and Related Agencies Appropriations Act for any fiscal year may be provided by contract or by grant (including a grant of funds to be available for student aid) to a covered educational entity if the Secretary of Defense determines that the covered educational entity has a policy or practice (regardless of when implemented) that either prohibits, or in effect prevents:
12 13 14 15 16		(1) the maintaining, establishing, or operation of a unit of the Senior Reserve Officer Training Corps (in accordance with section 454 of title 10, United States Code, and other applicant Federal laws) at the educational entity; or (2) a student in the covered educational entity from enrolling in a unit of the Senior Reserve Officer Training Corps at another institution of higher education."; and
17 18 19 20	WHEREAS:	On November 13, 1996, CSUS President Gerth received a memorandum from F. Pang of the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense inquiring about the policy of CSUS with respect to maintaining ROTC programs in relation to the newly enacted policies on ROTC Access to Campuses and Denial of Funds for Preventing ROTC Access to Campus; and
21 22 23 24 .25	WHEREAS:	Despite President Gerth's efforts to date to ascertain whether the action taken to phase out ROTC Programs at CSUS because of non-compliance with the University's nondiscrimination policy will result in the loss of federal financial aid for students at CSUS under the provisions of the Campus ROTC Access Act, the question remains unanswered; and
26 27	WHEREAS:	In 1995-96, 10,000 students at CSUS (42% of students enrolled at CSUS) received federal financial aid for a total of slightly over \$37 million dollars; and
28 29	WHEREAS:	The CSUS Academic Senate cannot, in good conscience, allow the rape of the institution's financial aid resources for students by the force of the U.S. Military; therefore be it
30 31 32	RESOLVED:	The CSUS Academic Senate reaffirms its support of the University's nondiscrimination policy and its position that programs that fail to comply with this policy, including ROTC, should not be allowed on campus; and be it further
33 34 35	RESOLVED:	The CSUS Academic Senate objects to the Campus ROTC Access Act which, in effect, authorizes the use of governmental force to establish and maintain ROTC Programs on University campuses; and be it further
36 37 38	RESOLVED:	The CSUS Academic Senate supports President Gerth in his efforts to uphold the principles and values of the University's nondiscrimination policy as it pertains to ROTC, but recognizes that he must also take into consideration the implications of discontinuing ROTC

Programs at CSUS in the event that the Department of Defense determines that such action constitutes an "anti-ROTC policy" and a basis for withdrawing federal financial aid for over 10,000 students at CSUS: and be it further

RESOLVED: The CSUS Academic Senate urges President Gerth to adhere to his decision to discontinue ROTC Programs at CSUS so long as the Department of Defense Policy on exclusion of homosexuals prohibits compliance with University Policy on nondiscrimination, and so long as such action does not result in the loss of federal financial aid grants to the institution; and be it further

RESOLVED: If it is determined that discontinuation of ROTC Programs at CSUS for failure to comply with the University's nondiscrimination policy would result in the loss of federal financial aid grants to the institution, the Academic Senate would support a decision made by President Gerth to allow ROTC programs to be imposed on the campus by the Department of Defense in order to maintain federal financial aid grants for thousands of CSUS students.
